RE: Memorializing the United States Congress to Pass the National Infrastructure Bank Act of 2023.

Honorable Legislators:

As a nation we face incredible challenges to our infrastructure. We must plan for the future and reinvest in existing physical and organizational structures and facilities. Well-maintained infrastructure is vital to providing clean water, safe highways and bridges, affordable housing, quality public transportation, access to high-speed broadband services, and improved access to many essential needs including educational and medical services.

The investments needed and funding for projects to repair, replace, maintain, and build vital infrastructure relies heavily on legislative packages that often do not include adequate funding to meet identified needs. However, this bill, H.R.4052, introduced by Illinois Representative Danny K. Davis, proposes a potential solution to our infrastructure dilemma through the creation of a National Infrastructure Bank. A National Infrastructure Bank (NIB) is a public bank to provide capital exclusively for infrastructure projects.

Under this NIB, potential projects will fall within 16 categories identified by the American Society of Civil Engineers and will include affordable housing, high-speed rail, and water projects that address drought conditions. Further, this NIB is large enough to finance each state's unmet infrastructure projects without adding to Federal taxes, the National Debt, or inflation.

H.R.4052: The National Infrastructure Bank Act of 2023 will create 25 million new jobs with prevailing wages, a preference for sourcing materials produced domestically, and an estimated five percent growth in GDP annually. We encourage the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives to pass this long overdue legislation. We also urge President Biden to follow suit and sign this into law.



**RE: Memorializing the New York State Legislature and Governor Hochul to Pass
Senate Bill S8340.**

Honorable Legislators:

Firefighters risk their lives every day to save the lives of others. When a firefighter runs out of a burning building, you may think the risk to their health has passed, but that is far from the truth. Cancer is the leading cause of death among firefighters, as they are routinely exposed to smoke and gaseous forms of chemicals on the job.

In fact, firefighters have a 60% higher risk for lung cancer than the general public and female firefighters are six times more likely to be diagnosed with breast cancer. Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center recommends all firefighters receive a comprehensive medical exam and cancer screening every year.

This bill, S8340, introduced by New York State Senator James Skoufis, would require coverage for full cancer screenings for all volunteer firefighter in New York State, both upon entry into a fire department and annually. It is imperative that we protect our firefighters as they have dedicated themselves to protecting us.

Senate Bill S8340 aims to ensure our volunteer firefighters receive the healthcare they deserve. We encourage the members of the Senate and the Assembly to pass this legislation. We also urge Governor Hochul to follow suit and sign this into law.

RE: Memorializing the New York State Legislature and Governor Hochul to Pass the Working Families Tax Credit.

Honorable Legislators:

Across New York State families are struggling to afford basic necessities; families in Monroe County are no exception. In a recent poll by The Children's Agenda, more than 60 percent of parents in Monroe County, with an annual household income of less than \$100,000 a year, reported they struggle to afford their rents or mortgages and frequently have to ration food in their household between paychecks.

No parents should have to worry about keeping a roof over their children's heads or food in their children's stomachs. Child tax credits can help parents keep cash in their pockets and give children in our county, and across the state, the stability they need to grow and thrive.

This bill, A4022/S277, introduced by Assemblymember Andrew Hevesi and New York State Senator Andrew Gounardes would consolidate the Dependent Exemption, the Earned Income Credit, and the Empire State Child Credit into a single Working Families Tax Credit. Further, this bill would increase the credit per child for lower-income filers to \$1,600, with a gradual phase-down for higher income earners, while indexing the credit to fluctuate with yearly inflation rates.

A4022/S277: Working Families Tax Credit will provide families across New York with much need piece of mind by allowing them to keep more of their money in pocket during tax season. We encourage the members of the New York State Assembly and Senate to pass this legislation. We also urge Governor Hochul to follow suit and sign this into law.



RE: Urging the Call of a Ceasefire in Gaza

Honorable Legislators:

On December 12, 2023, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution demanding a humanitarian ceasefire in Gaza and 153 nations voted in favor of this resolution. The United States was one of only 10 countries who voted in the negative.

On December 19, 2023, UNICEF described the Gaza Strip as “the most dangerous place in the world to be a child.” On January 26, 2024, the International Court of Justice responded to a case brought by South Africa and directed Israel to ensure that it does not commit acts that might fall within the scope of the “Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide.”

On February 20, 2024, the United States vetoed a second United Nations resolution demanding an immediate humanitarian ceasefire. The violence continues and the United States still refuses to join with the international community and call for a permanent ceasefire. These failures continue to endanger Palestinian and Israeli civilians and, as always, poor and working class people suffer the most.

Since October 7, 2023, more than 30,000 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza. Over 72,000 have been wounded and upwards of 2 million people have been displaced.

The United States needs to demand an immediate and permanent ceasefire, the release of all hostages, the unrestricted entry of humanitarian aid into Gaza, and the end to all U.S. military aid used to uphold systems of apartheid.

Enough is enough. Our actions and words matter - they carry weight. The people of Gaza and Israel need us to take action. The children of Gaza need us to be their voice. The families of the hostages need us to help bring their loved ones home.

We urge the members of the House of Representatives and Senate, and President Biden to call for an immediate and permanent ceasefire in Gaza.

Subject: Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to Enact Increases for Local Highway, Bridge, and Culvert Programs

Honorable Legislators:

On Tuesday, January 16th, Governor Hochul unveiled her \$233 billion executive budget proposal. In doing so, the Governor recommended major cuts to the State's Consolidated Local Streets and Highway Improvement Program, commonly known as CHIPS, and other transportation-based funds. In sum, the proposal would eliminate a total of \$100 million in funding for local roads in New York State, with a reduction of \$60 million in CHIPS aid and a \$40 million reduction in State Touring Route Aid. In Monroe County, this would jeopardize critical future infrastructure projects that, in 2023, utilized over \$6 million in CHIPS funding. These and other funding sources, such as Extreme Winter Recovery (EWR), Operation Pave our Potholes (POP), BRIDGE-NY, and PAVE-NY, are the primary sources of funding for local infrastructure, including roads, bridges, and culverts.

Throughout New York State, locally owned roads and bridges account for 87 percent of the roadways and 50 percent of the bridges, amounting to 46 percent of the vehicle miles New Yorkers travel each and every day. State funding is vital for the continued upkeep of our transportation infrastructure – especially in a State where, according to a recent analysis by the New York State Association of Town Superintendents of Highways, faces an annual funding gap of over \$2 billion. To make matters worse, according to recent TRIP reports, approximately 10% of bridges and 43% of roadways in New York State are rated as structurally deficient or in poor condition – and according to some reports on Rochester, nearly 13% of major roadways are considered to be in poor condition and 120 local bridges in need of repair.

If misery loves company, our infrastructure failures are no exemption as they are now joined by inflationary pressures causing costs from construction labor to material prices to skyrocket – combined, travelers will certainly have company in their misery all across New York State. According to the Federal Highway Administration's National Highway Construction Cost Index, costs have risen 58.6 percent due to inflation since the end of 2020. The Governor and the New York State Legislature should be increasing funding to meet rising costs and increased demand – not cutting them.

The annual funding gaps, coupled with deteriorating infrastructure and increased costs continuing to rise due to inflation, will mean catastrophic deficiencies if Governor Hochul's proposed funding cut is enacted. These are not just numbers on a page of poor conditions; they represent real risks to the safety of

our residents, and they mean detours, delays, and dangerous situations. This can lead to accidents, deadly infrastructure failures, and wear and tear on families' transportation - according to the latest analysis from TRIP, roads, and bridges that are deficient, congested, or lack desirable safety features cost New York motorists an additional \$36.7 billion annually, up to \$3,697 per driver in some areas.

Our communities deserve better; failing infrastructure directly impacts local families' day-to-day lives and budgets and has been shown to decrease trade and economic development, job creation, agriculture, business, public health, and education. In addition to these financial and business costs, poor roads and bridges jeopardize public safety responses and coordination – when seconds can make the difference, a bridge or road closure can truly mean life or death.

Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to ensure that New York State commits adequate funding for local highway construction and maintenance while recognizing the impact of unprecedented inflation on the value of state funding and purchasing power for these programs. We call upon the New York State Legislature to correct the Governor's course and support a \$60 million restoration of the CHIPS program, a \$40 million restoration in EWR funding, and an additional \$150 million to restore purchasing power over the remaining 3 years of the 5-year Transportation Capital Plan.

Subject: Memorializing United States Congress and New York State to Strengthen Laws against Anti-Semitism; Reaffirming Support of Monroe County’s Jewish Community, Israel and Commitment against All Forms of Anti-Semitism

Honorable Legislators:

On October 7, 2023, Hamas, an organization designated by the United States as a foreign terrorist organization, launched a massive, unprovoked war on Israel by air, land, and sea. This barbaric assault took place just after the 50th anniversary of the multi-front 1973 Yom Kippur War against Israel and while Israeli Jews were preparing to celebrate Simchat Torah. Hamas terrorists crossed the Israeli land border, murdering civilians and abducting hostages in more than 20 municipalities in southern Israel, including children and the elderly. The initial attack killed more than 1,300 Israelis and injured thousands more. As of today, there are over 100 hostages still held in Gaza.

Monroe County is blessed to be called home by over 19,000 Jewish residents. As many of these residents continue to personally grapple with the extremely violent face of anti-Semitism across the world, they are now forced to deal with local anti-Semitism as well – right here at the Monroe County Office Building (COB). In December of last year, protestors disrupted the Full Legislature meeting, causing business to cease for hours as they chanted amongst other anti-Semitic rhetoric, ‘intifada,’ and first vandalized the Israeli flag displayed in front of the COB. As the Jewish Federation of Greater Rochester stated, this is “a call to genocide, and it’s a call to kill Jews. That’s what the ‘intifada is, and that’s what the ‘intifada’ does.” This is blatant and threatening anti-Semitism.

Unfortunately, on March 2, these perpetrators again vandalized the County Office Building’s Israeli flag display. As the individual tore down the flag, he chanted obscenities alongside, “...not in our Town, not in our Town...you don’t belong here in our town.” This is a genuinely disgusting statement, coupled with action of rabid anti-Semitism that, in any other scenario, would rightly be followed up with charges of hate crime - defined according to the NYS Penal Code as a specified offense where an individual “intentionally commits the act or acts constituting the offense in whole or in substantial part because of a belief or perception regarding...race...national origin...ancestry...religion, religious practice.”

Therefore, we ask you to join us in reaffirming our commitment to our Jewish community, unequivocally condemning Hamas’ war on Israel, affirming Israel’s right to self-defense, calling for the unconditional release of all hostages, condemning all acts of anti-Semitism, and calling for the use, and strengthening, of laws against such blatant acts of anti-Semitism.

RE: Establishing the Monroe County Committee on Housing

Honorable Legislators:

The purpose of this legislation is to create the Monroe County Committee on Housing to make recommendations to the Legislature on actions Monroe County can take to address regional housing issues including but not limited to homelessness, evictions, age-in-place, workforce housing, and first-time home buying while promoting affordable housing options. Housing has significant consequences on our community, as it can negatively impact public safety, healthcare, education, and workforce development.

There is ample evidence for the need for this Committee:

- Monroe County made more than 10,000 placements in emergency housing in 2023, and expects the need to increase this year;
- New York's public assistance shelter rent allowance has not changed since 2003 and stands at \$343 for a family of three occupying a two-bedroom apartment for Monroe County. The Fair Market Rent, however, is \$1,186 for a two-bedroom unit;
- The Rochester Housing Authority has not opened the Section 8 waitlist for new applications since 2019. The waiting list for one-bedrooms in the units it manages was closed last fall;
- Monroe County has the fourth highest rate of evictions in the state, with 7.6% of renters facing evictions in 2022, leading to more than 8,500 eviction proceedings;
- The Children's Agenda reported that 8% of Rochester students were homeless at some point during the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 school years, which can lead to poor academic performance and behavioral issues;
- A Children's Agenda poll found that 76% of households with incomes below \$50,000 struggled to find housing they could afford;
- ACT Rochester reported that half of Monroe County households are "rent-burdened," meaning they spend 30% or more of their income on rent;
- Many community populations are projected to continue getting older. Consequently, this means the proportion of residents over the age of 55 will increase in the next 15 to 20 years. Age-in-place housing for senior citizens can meet the special housing needs and interests of this growing population;

- Workforce housing is housing built to serve families that exist between affordable housing and more higher-income housing. Typically, they serve families that earn between 80 and 120 percent of median income of the area market. Workforce Housing can provide the ability of workers to live in the community where they work; and
- A First-Time Home Buyer Metro Affordability Report finds that First-time buyers are typically constrained by tight budgets and credit history issues that make first-time home buying difficult. Low mortgage rates do not always help due to high prices and competition for homes.


The Monroe County Committee on Housing is designed to be inclusive of multiple perspectives, stakeholders, and disciplines. A key question for members is what more can be done locally to aid individuals and families in need of safe and affordable housing and/or at risk of losing their homes. The creation of the Committee acknowledges that we cannot afford to wait for updated federal and state policies to meet the growing needs in our community.

The Committee shall be comprised of 15 members appointed by the President in accordance with Section C2-4(B)(5) of the Monroe County Code as follows:

- 1) Four (4) members chosen by the County Executive or his designee;
- 2) Two (2) Legislators chosen by the Majority Leader;
- 3) Two (2) Legislators chosen by the Minority leader;
- 4) Six (6) members appointed by the President, including three with past experience with housing issues; and
- 5) The Vice-President of the Legislature shall chair the Committee.

The establishment of the Committee will have no impact on the current Monroe County budget.

RESOLUTION NO. ____ OF 2024

ESTABLISHING THE MONROE COUNTY COMMITTEE ON HOUSING

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. As the Monroe County Legislature recognizes that quality and affordable housing is vital to safe and thriving communities, the Monroe County Legislature authorizes the creation of the Monroe County Committee on Housing.

Section 2. The Monroe County Committee on Housing shall advise the Legislature on measures to reduce homelessness and increase housing affordability. The task force will include, but not be limited to, proposing ways to aid unhoused individuals and families, preventing evictions and constructing additional housing units.

Section 3. The Committee shall be composed of fifteen (15) voting members who are Monroe County residents and who shall be appointed by the President of the Legislature and confirmed by the Legislature in accordance with Section C2-4(B)(5) of the Monroe County Code in the following manner:

- 1) Four (4) members recommended by the County Executive or his designee;
- 2) Two (2) Legislators recommended by the Majority Leader;
- 3) Two (2) Legislators recommended by the Minority Leader;
- 4) Six (6) members recommended by the President of the Legislature, including three with past experience with housing issues; and
- 5) The Vice-President of the Legislature shall chair the Committee.

Section 4. The Monroe County Committee on Housing shall have a minimum of two public hearings.

Section 5. The Monroe County Committee on Housing shall deliver a report to the Legislature with initial recommendations on or about September 1, 2024. Following reports will be delivered to the Legislature as determined by the Chair.

Section 6. Staff to the Legislature President and Majority will prepare all minutes, notes and reports for the Monroe County Committee on Housing.

Section 7. The Committee shall terminate upon the issuance of its recommendation to the Legislature.

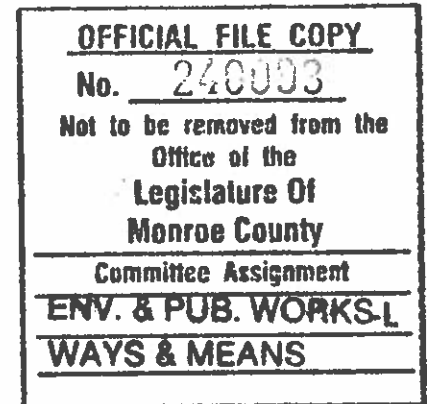

Subject: Authorize a Contract with Passero Associates, Engineering, Architecture & Surveying, P.C. for Design Services for the Ramp Garage Maintenance Repair Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with Passero Associates, Engineering, Architecture & Surveying, P.C. in the amount of \$58,500 for design services for the Ramp Garage Maintenance Repair Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport for the period of April 9, 2024 through December 31, 2027.

This project will upgrade the existing parking garage and its related facilities to maintain the integrity of the building. The garage was constructed approximately 30 years ago and requires periodic maintenance to maintain its condition. The scope of the project includes miscellaneous minor concrete repair, routing and sealing of cracks on the elevated decks, repair of helix ramp cracks, application of concrete sealer on the Main and East Garages, core extraction and analysis of chloride content, expansion joint repairs, and miscellaneous concrete and building envelope repairs at the stairs.

The Department of Aviation recommends authorization of a contract with Passero Associates, Engineering, Architecture & Surveying, P.C., a designated airport consultant per Resolution 365 of 2023, to provide design services for the Ramp Garage Maintenance Repair Project in the amount of \$58,500.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Passero Associates, Engineering, Architecture & Surveying, P.C., 242 West Main Street, Suite 100, Rochester, New York 14614, for design services for the Ramp Garage Maintenance Repair Project at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport in the amount of \$58,500, along with any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation for the period of April 9, 2024 through December 31, 2027.


This action is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c) (1) (“maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility”) and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract, consistent with authorized uses, is included in capital fund 1870 and any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. The funding for this project will be provided by the Monroe County Airport Authority from Airport generated revenues. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that neither Passero Associates, Engineering, Architecture & Surveying, P.C., nor any of its principal officers, owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes. The principal officers of the firm are:

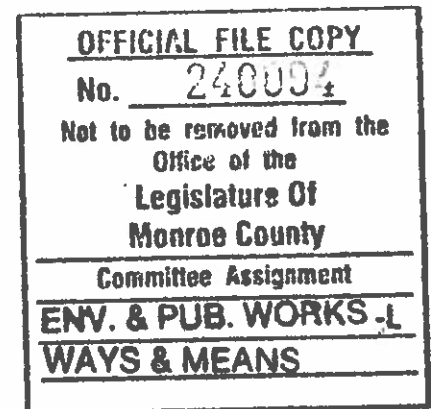

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a grant agreement with the State of New York to accept financial assistance related to three (3) projects at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport.

New York State requires a formal resolution by Your Honorable Body to release State Aid monies to Monroe County for these projects. The three (3) projects are associated with the 2023 Aviation Capital Grant Program.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a grant agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the State of New York to accept financial assistance for the three (3) projects listed above at the Frederick Douglass-Greater Rochester International Airport.

For all of the projects listed above, this is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c) (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these projects, consistent with authorized uses, are included in capital funds 1736 and 1824, and any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. The local funding for these projects will ultimately be provided by the Monroe County Airport Authority from Airport generated revenues. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

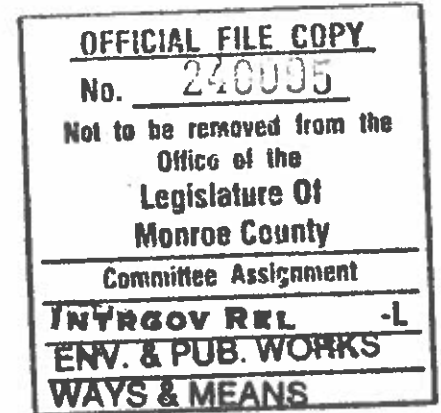

Subject: Acceptance of a Grant from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Water Quality Program and Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District in the amount of \$107,200 for the period of April 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025 for the Water Quality Program and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District in an amount not to exceed \$77,600 for the completion of water quality projects for the period of April 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025.

The purpose of this grant is to assist counties that are members of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance ("FL-LOWPA") in funding programs to improve water quality. Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District is the sponsor organization for FL-LOWPA, responsible for the administration of this grant. In Monroe County, program components will include planning, education, and implementation of individual projects to improve water quality. The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District will utilize a portion of the grant (\$77,600) to provide storm water management consulting and project management services to identify and implement water quality improvement projects such as stream bank erosion and shoreline stabilization in Monroe County and serve as the program manager for the New York State Watercraft Steward Program to control invasive species in Monroe County. A portion of the grant (\$29,600) will be used by Monroe County to undertake water quality programs including the United States Geological Survey Cooperative Agreement for stream monitoring. The County has received this program specific grant for over two decades.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$107,200 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Water Quality Program for the period of April 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025.

2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$107,200 into pure waters fund 9307, funds center 8572020100, Office of Sustainability and Environmental Quality.
3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, 145 Paul Road, Building 5, Rochester, New York 14624, for the completion of water quality projects in an amount not to exceed \$77,600 for the period of April 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025.
4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant awards in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant periods according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.
5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c) (27) (“conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action”) and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Subject: Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Town of Penfield for the Use of a County Owned Parcel Located at 1775 Kennedy Road

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable body authorize an intermunicipal agreement (“IMA”) with the Town of Penfield for the town to use a County owned parcel located at 1775 Kennedy Road for a term of two years from the date of execution, with the option to renew for two (2) additional two-year terms.

Through this IMA, the Town of Penfield will use seven (7) acres of the 76-acre County-owned property as a temporary brush drop-off center for residents. Project components include the construction of a 24-foot-wide stone driveway with an asphalt apron up to 600 feet long and a brush drop-off area of up to five (5) acres comprised of crushed stone millings. The project also includes installing up to 1,070 feet long of 6-foot chain link fencing with locking gates to enclose the proposed usable area.


The primary use of the proposed area will provide the Town with a residential drop-off location for brush materials only. It will also function as a temporary outdoor storage of the Town’s Department of Public Works (“DPW”) materials and supplies (e.g., precast catch basins, pipe, stone, and spoil material) during the construction of the Town’s DPW new facility at its current location (1607 Jackson Road). The County will have future long-term use of the modified portion of the property beyond the term of the IMA.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Penfield for the town to use a County owned parcel located at 1775 Kennedy Road for a term of two years from the date of execution, with the option to renew for two (2) additional two-year terms.

This action is a Type I Action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), for which the Town of Penfield will serve as Lead Agency. The provisions of SEQRA shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking and approving the action of this referral.

This agreement will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Subject: Authorizing Agreements for Commercial Events to be Held in Monroe County Parks in 2024

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize agreements to permit the following commercial use of County park facilities for which an admission price or per-class fee will be charged:

- **Mortalis Brewing Co. LLC** for the **Swiftwater-Mortalis Luau**, a ticketed craft beer exhibition and party to be held at the Robach Center at Ontario Beach Park. This year is the 6th luau and is scheduled for July 13, 2024.
- **Rochester A.B.O.V.E.** for the **Pan-Afrikan Festival**, a community cultural celebration featuring live music and food and craft vendors, to be held at the Highland Park Bowl. This year is the 16th festival and it is scheduled for August 3, 2024.
- **Monica Daniel Gil** for the **Amazonia Camp**, a bilingual English/Spanish nature-themed day program, to be held at Pavilion Lodge for one to three weeks, weekdays only, in July and August 2024, with an option to open a short-duration winter break camp in December 2024. This is the 2nd year of Amazonia Camp in County parks.
- **Charles Settlement House, Inc.** for various **day programs for city youth** to be held at picnic shelters in Seneca Park and Genesee Valley Park on approximately 25 dates in July and August 2024. This is at least the 9th year that Charles Settlement House has held such programs in County parks.
- **Deaf Events Among Families Circle, Inc.** for the **KODA + Deaf Day Camp** at Powder Mills Park, for one week in June 2024. This is the 5th year this camp will be held at Powder Mills Park.
- **Renee Thompson**, for “Tinkergarten” and “Nature Babies Peaceful Play” educational and recreational group events for young children in Highland and Powder Mills Parks on various dates throughout 2024. This is the 7th year of Tinkergarten classes or group events being offered.
- **Rochester Brainery, LLC** for about two classes per month on hiking instruction and the natural history of parks, to be held on various Fridays and Sundays between May and September. This is the 2nd year of Brainery activities in County parks.
- **Operation Patriot Foundation, Inc.** for the Let’s Roll! 9/11 Tribute to be held at Ontario Beach Park on September 7, 2024. This is the 24th annual tribute event, but the first year that the organizers are seeking to add a ticketed component charging admission to the event.

As part of this licensing process, each group would be required to pay the normal daily rental fee established in the 2024 Monroe County Budget for any park lodge or shelter used, as well as a standard Special Use Event Permit fee based on the anticipated attendance at their event (\$350 for over 1,000 people, \$150 for 251-1000 people, and \$50 up to 250 people.) Events would be required to submit proof of insurance as required for parks special events and proof of appropriate licensing or permitting for other activities subject to such restrictions (e.g., liquor permits or licensing to operate a summer camp).


The specific legislative action required is to authorize agreements to permit commercial use of County park facilities with Mortalis Brewing Co. LLC, Rochester A.B.O.V.E., Monica Daniel Gil, Charles Settlement House, Inc., Deaf Events Among Families Circle, Inc., Renee Thompson, Rochester Brainery, LLC, and Operation Patriot Foundation, Inc.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5(c)(21) (“minor temporary uses of land having negligible or no permanent impact on the environment”) and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These license agreements are revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records of the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of the named entities, nor, if not a not-for-profit, their principal officers, owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 382 of 2018 to accept additional funding from the New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$70,000 and extend the time period for thirteen months, through January 31, 2025, for the STD Testing in Safety Net Populations Program and amend Resolution 412 of 2020, as amended by Resolution 421 of 2021, as amended by Resolution 369 of 2022, as amended by Resolution 368 of 2023, to amend and increase the contract with Rochester Regional Health to provide clinical laboratory services through its Rochester General Hospital Permitted Laboratories for the Monroe County Department of Public Health from an amount not to exceed \$996,000 to an amount not to exceed \$1,066,000 for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024.

The purpose of this grant is to provide screening for Chlamydia and Gonorrhea in high-risk populations. Testing will be provided at various locations in Monroe County including the Monroe County Department of Public Health's Sexual Health Clinic. Funds will be used for laboratory testing through a vendor contract with Rochester Regional Health, through its Rochester General Hospital Permitted Laboratories. This additional funding will be used to support the contract for an additional year and will bring the total program award to \$420,000.

This contract will support the County's Tuberculosis Control Program, Sexual Health Clinic, Sexually Transmitted Infection and HIV Control Program, and the Office of the Medical Examiner. This vendor will provide clinical laboratory services including but not limited to microbiological and hematological testing of specimens submitted by the MCDPH.



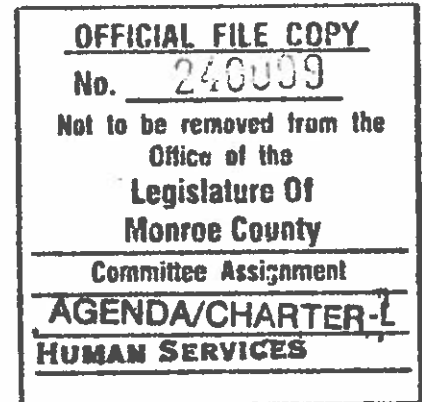

Subject: Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Town of Hamlin for the Administration of the Wiler Road Bridge Project

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Hamlin for 100% reimbursement to the County of all costs relating to the administration of the Wiler Road Bridge Project in the estimated amount of \$50,000 with the final amount to be determined upon project completion.


This effort involves the administration, by Monroe County, of a federally-aided bridge project on behalf of the Town of Hamlin. The Wiler Road Bridge is a Town of Hamlin owned bridge that spans West Creek in the Town of Hamlin. The project involves the rehabilitation or replacement of the bridge along with highway approach and channel improvements. Monroe County work will include County staff overseeing consultant selection, design, right-of-way activities, construction, and construction inspection for the project. The initial cost of this work is estimated at \$50,000 with all costs to be reimbursed 100% by the Town of Hamlin. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2024-2025 with an anticipated construction start in 2026. The current total project estimate is \$2,000,000.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Hamlin for 100% reimbursement to the County of all costs relating to the administration of the Wiler Road Bridge Project in the estimated amount of \$50,000 with the final amount to be determined upon project completion.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This intermunicipal agreement is revenue generating. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

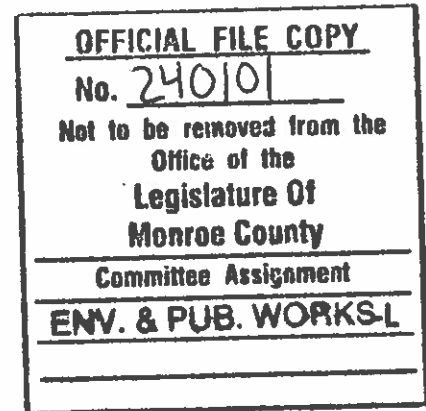

Subject: Designation to Serve as Lead Agency, Classification of Action, and Determination of Significance Pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates (the "Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project") may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves rehabilitation of: Elmgrove Road from Buffalo Road to Spencerport Road (Town of Gates), Brighton-Henrietta Townline Road from Jefferson Road to South Winton Road (Towns of Brighton and Henrietta), and South Winton Road from Brighton-Henrietta Townline Road to Westfall Road (Town of Henrietta). The work involves milling and repaving, spot pavement repairs, cleaning/adjusting drainage basins and pipes, traffic signal loops and/or detection cameras, new pavement markings/signs, replacement of sidewalk ramps to meet the current ADA standards, and installation of sidewalk along the east side of Elmgrove Road between Lyell Road and Spencerport Road (NY Rte. 31).

The specific legislative actions required are:


1. Designate Monroe County as Lead Agency for a coordinated review of Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project.
2. Determine that Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Gates, Brighton, and Henrietta is an Unlisted action.
3. Make a determination of significance regarding the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.7.

4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.



Surface Waters and Wetlands

South Winton Road

A review of available United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) mapping indicated the presence of several water resources in the South Winton Road Project Area including Allen Creek, the Erie Canal, and four unnamed streams.

A review of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) state regulated freshwater wetlands mapping indicates there are no state-mapped wetlands within the Project Area. NYSDEC stream classification mapping indicates Allen Creek and the Erie Canal are Class B waterbodies and the four unnamed streams, also identified by the USFWS NWI mapping, are Class C waterbodies. The best usage for Class B waters is swimming and other contact recreation, but not for drinking water. The best uses for Class C waters are fishing and primary and secondary contact recreation. The Erie Canal is also a Section 10 Navigable Water.

Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road

A review of available USFWS NWI mapping indicated the presence of several water resources in the Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road Project Area including Allen Creek, Red Creek and one unnamed stream.

A review of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) state regulated freshwater wetlands mapping indicates the presence of two state regulated wetland check-zones within the Project Area. NYSDEC stream classification mapping indicates Allen Creek as Class B and Red Creek and the unnamed stream as Class C waterbodies. Best uses for Class B and Class C waterbodies are listed above.

Elmgrove Road

A review of available USFWS NWI mapping indicated the presence of several water resources in the Elmgrove Road Project Area including two unmapped streams.

A review of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) state regulated freshwater wetlands mapping indicates the presence of one state regulated wetland check-zones within the Project Area. NYSDEC stream classification mapping indicates both unnamed stream as Class C waterbodies. Best uses for Class C waterbodies are listed above.

EDR environmental scientists conducted a site reconnaissance of the three Project locations on September 20, 2022 and confirmed the presence of the mapped streams and wetlands. In addition, several small, isolated emergent wetlands at all three project sites were observed throughout the Project Area adjacent to the roadside and did not appear to be associated with the recorded streams. The proposed Project activities are limited to milling, paving and minor upgrades within the existing public road ROWs and are therefore not anticipated to impact any adjacent wetlands or streams, nor the Erie Canal. If there is any expansion of the proposed limits of disturbance, a formal wetland delineation may be required as well as additional review under federal and state regulations.

Floodplains

South Winton Road

According to Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Maps, two portions of the South Winton Road are located within Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs). The

first is where an unnamed stream crosses under South Winton Road, south of Greenwich Lane, and is mapped as a 100-year floodplain, an area inundated by a 1% chance of annual flooding. The second SFHA on South Winton Road is the site where South Winton Road crosses over the Erie Canal and is also mapped as a 100-year floodplain.

Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road

According to FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps, portions of Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road are located within SFHAs. A 100-year floodplain is associated with the site where the Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road crosses over Allen Creek. Additionally, the western end of the Project Area associated with Brighton Henrietta Town Line Road, from Western Drive to West Jefferson Road, is a mapped with both 100-year and 500-year floodplains, an area inundated by a 0.2% annual chance of annual flooding.

Elmgrove Road

According to FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps, a portion of Brighton-Henrietta Town Line Road are located within SFHAs. Elmgrove Road has one site listed as a 100-year floodplain where Elmford Road intersects with Elmgrove Road.

The proposed Project includes the improvement of existing public infrastructure that is considered a functionally dependent use. The Project is therefore anticipated to be in compliance with Executive Order 11988: Floodplain Management and is not subject to floodplain encroachment requirements.

Threatened and Endangered Species

The USFWS Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) system was reviewed on September 28, 2022, to identify federally listed threatened and/or endangered species that are potentially present within the Project vicinity. The IPaC identified the monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*) as a candidate species potentially occurring within the vicinity of the Project at all three locations. Under the classification as a candidate species, no further consultation is required. No threatened or endangered species were identified. Based on this result, no impact to federally listed threatened and/or endangered species is anticipated, and no further consultation under the IPaC regulatory review process is required.

The New York Natural Heritage Program (NYNHP) was consulted on September 19, 2022 to identify any state listed threatened or endangered species that are potentially present within the Project vicinity. The NYNHP indicated in a response letter dated September 7, 2021 (received via email on September 9, 2022) that the unlisted, imperiled Lilliput (*Toxolasma parvum*) freshwater mussel species was identified where Allen Creek runs adjacent to South Winton Road and where Red Creek crosses underneath Brighton Henrietta Town Line Road. The NYNHP did not identify the presence of rare or state-listed animals or plants, or significant natural communities at the Project Area associated with Elmgrove Road (Attachment E).

Given the nature of the Project as a highway maintenance project, Project activities will be contained to the road surface and sidewalks. There are no anticipated impacts to Red Creek or Allen Creek or the freshwater mussels resulting from Project activities.

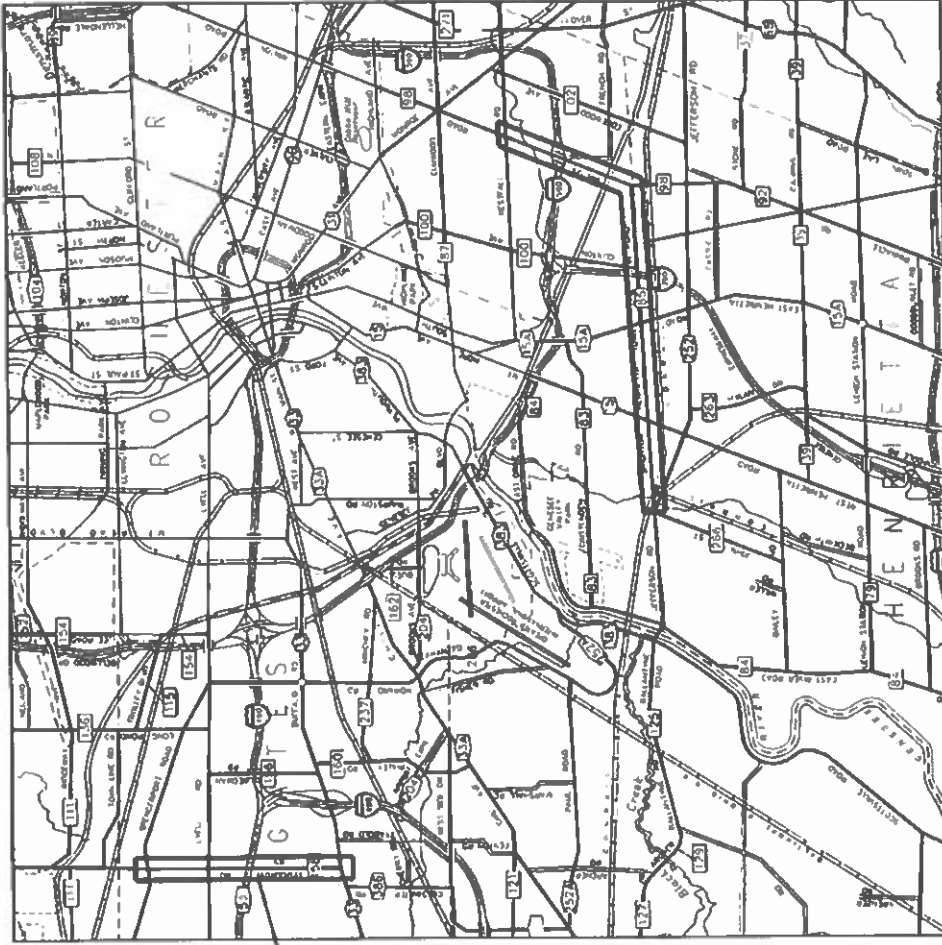

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 411 of 2023 to provide an increase in funding in the amount of \$1,650,000; authorize a contract with Villager Construction Inc. in the amount of \$7,965,000 for construction services; and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Gates for sidewalk installation for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates.

This project involves rehabilitation of: Elmgrove Road from Buffalo Road to Spencerport Road (Town of Gates), Brighton-Henrietta Townline Road from Jefferson Road to South Winton Road (Towns of Brighton and Henrietta), and South Winton Road from Brighton-Henrietta Townline Road to Westfall Road (Town of Henrietta). The work involves milling and repaving, spot pavement repairs, cleaning/adjusting drainage basins and pipes, traffic signal loops and/or detection cameras, new pavement markings/signs, and replacement of sidewalk ramps to meet the current ADA standards. During the design for this project, the Town of Gates expressed an interest in the installation of sidewalks along the east side of Elmgrove Road between Lyell Road and Spencerport Road (NY Rte. 31), and will reimburse the County for the local share of this work. Subsequently, the County included this sidewalk work in the final design for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project and this intermunicipal agreement will allow the Town of Gates to reimburse the County for the local share of the costs relating to the sidewalk installation. The Town's share of the sidewalk costs is estimated at \$41,000. The total estimated project cost is \$9,675,000. The current schedule is to start work in spring 2024 with an anticipated completion by fall 2024.

Major funding will be provided by Federal and New York State Department of Transportation funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

The following four (4) bids were received on January 17, 2024:

The bids have been reviewed and Villager Construction Inc. has been determined to be the lowest responsible bidder pursuant to General Municipal Law §103.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2024 Capital Budget to increase funding for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates in the amount of \$1,650,000, from \$8,025,000 to \$9,675,000, for a total project authorization of \$9,675,000.
2. Amend Bond Resolution 411 of 2023 to increase financing for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates, capital fund 2041, in the amount of \$1,650,000, from \$8,025,000 to \$9,675,000, for a total project authorization of \$9,675,000.
3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Villager Construction Inc., 425 Old Macedon Center Road, Fairport, New York 14450, in the amount of \$7,965,000 for construction services for the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.
4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Gates for reimbursement to Monroe County of the local share of the design and construction costs relating to the installation of sidewalks in conjunction with the Highway Preventive Maintenance #10 Project in the Towns of Brighton, Henrietta, and Gates in the estimated amount of \$41,000, with the final amount to be determined upon project completion.


The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving the action requested in this referral.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in capital fund 2041 once the additional financing authorization herein is approved and in any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program to advance the Jacobs Road Bridge Project from 2028 to 2024; amend the 2024 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Jacobs Road Bridge" in the amount of \$312,000; authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$312,000; and authorize contracts with Ravi Engineering and Land Surveying, P.C. in the amount of \$234,963.08 for engineering services and the New York State Department of Transportation for the Jacobs Road Bridge Project in the Town of Hamlin.

The Jacobs Road Bridge is County owned and spans the Yanty Creek, in the Town of Hamlin. The project involves the rehabilitation or replacement of the bridge along with highway approach and channel improvements. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2024-2025 with an anticipated construction start in 2026. The current total project estimate is \$1,493,000.

Major funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Monroe County was recently awarded Federal funding for this project through the Bridge NY program. New York State requires that construction of the project begin no later than two (2) years after award and that the project be completed within three (3) years of commencing construction.

Several consultants were considered, with Ravi Engineering and Land Surveying, P.C. rated the most qualified for this project. Ravi Engineering and Land Surveying, P.C. proposes to provide the services in the amount of \$234,963.08.





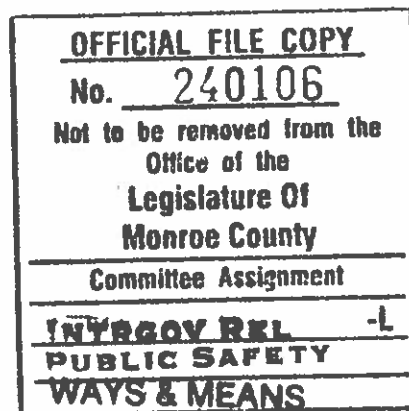

Subject: Acceptance of a Grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the Raise the Age Legislation and Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Rochester City School District for an Administrative and Education Liaison Provider with Raise the Age Youth

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$2,960,673 for the Raise the Age legislation for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024 and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Rochester City School District in the amount of \$170,000 for an Administrative and Education Liaison provider with Raise the Age youth for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.

Raise the Age legislation was enacted with a number of objectives. It aims to reduce crime victimization; provide meaningful opportunity for a life without the stigma of a criminal record for adolescents who turn away from crime; eliminate the disproportionate incarceration of 16- and 17-year-olds of color in adult jails and prisons; reserve the juvenile placement system for only those young people who present a risk to public safety; and create therapeutic out-of-home placement settings for young people who do not present a risk to public safety.

In order to achieve these objectives, the Monroe County Office of Probation – Community Corrections has developed a Comprehensive Plan that utilizes a combination of increased staff resources, specialized training, and expanded community programs and services.

Implementation of the Comprehensive Plan will reduce the reliance on out-of-home placement, reduce the reliance on detention, reduce the need for family court adjudication, increase the adjustment rate of diversion cases, reduce the rate of probation violations, reduce the rate of long-term recidivism, and arrange for community-based services to improve outcomes for youth.

A portion of this grant will fund an intermunicipal agreement with the Rochester City School District to provide an Administrative Specialist/Educational Liaison who will work on behalf of Raise the Age youth to facilitate re-entry into school or other educational programming. The Rochester City School District is a Sole Source provider of this service.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$2,960,673 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the Raise the Age Legislation for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.

2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, by appropriating the sum of \$561,383 into general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division.
3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Rochester City School District for an Administrative and Education Liaison provider with Raise the Age youth in the amount of \$170,000 for the period April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.
4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections, general fund 9300, funds center 2403020100, Juvenile Services Family Division. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

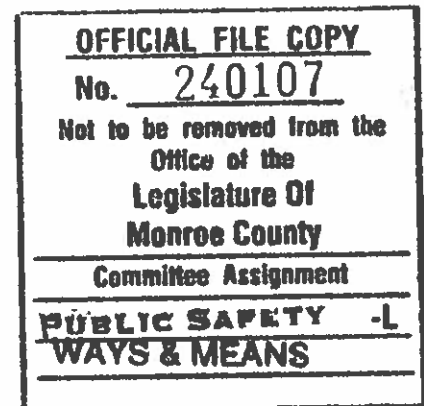

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of District Attorney Sandra Doorley and Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize Federal Equitable Sharing Agreements with the United States Department of Justice and the United States Department of the Treasury, for participation by the Monroe County District Attorney's Office and the Monroe County Sheriff's Office in the federal equitable sharing programs for federally forfeited cash, property, and proceeds obtained in the course of joint law enforcement investigations and prosecutions for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024.

In an effort to further encourage cooperation among federal, state and local law enforcement agencies and to punish and deter criminal activity by depriving criminals of property used or acquired through illegal activities, the United States Congress provided the Secretary of the Treasury and the United States Attorney General with the authority to share federally forfeited cash, property and proceeds with participating federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. The shared funds, property, and proceeds must be used for law enforcement purposes. This will be the 33rd year the County has participated in this program.



The specific legislative actions required are:



3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Subject: Acceptance of a Grant from the United States Department of Justice, United States Marshals Service Western District of New York for the United States Marshals Service NY/NJ Regional Fugitive Task Force-Rochester Division

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Sheriff Todd K. Baxter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the United States Department of Justice, United States Marshals Service ("USMS") Western District of New York in an amount not to exceed \$35,000 for the reimbursement of overtime for the United States Marshals Service New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force-Rochester Division for the period of October 2, 2023 through September 30, 2024.

This grant continues to support the collaborative task force with the USMS to investigate, apprehend and arrest violent felony fugitives. The grant will reimburse a portion of the overtime costs associated with the task force services. This will be the fifteenth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding is a decrease of \$10,070 from last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:


1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$35,000 and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the United States Department of Justice, United States Marshals Service Western District of New York for the reimbursement of overtime for the United States Marshals Service New York/New Jersey Regional Fugitive Task Force-Rochester Division for the period of October 2, 2023 through September 30, 2024.

2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Office of the Sheriff by appropriating the sum of \$35,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 3803010000, Police Bureau Administration.
3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) (“routine or continuing agency administration and management, not included new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment”) and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the United States Department of Justice, United States Marshals Service Western District of New York. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Subject: Acceptance of a Grant from the New York State Department of Health for Support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Department of Health in an amount not to exceed \$112,226 to support the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program ("NFP") for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.

The purpose of this grant is to provide support of the County's existing NFP program. The NFP program is an evidence-based nurse home visiting program that has been rigorously evaluated and includes expertly trained nurses delivering the services per a standard curriculum. The grant will provide a portion of the funding for the NFP program, which annually provides home visits to up to 300 high-risk, first time mothers, their infants, and families to improve their pregnancy outcomes and their health, well-being, and self-sufficiency. The funds will be used to support a previously-authorized vendor contract that provides the nurses who make home visits to all NFP clients. This will be the sixth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$22,445 from the previous year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$112,226 from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health to support the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program for the period of April 1, 2023 through March 31, 2024.
2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$112,226, into general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership.
3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant awards in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any encumbered balances during the grant periods according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications with the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.


